

Observer report for Tri Nitro Tournament 2015 (Riichi, MERS 1)

Participants: 23 players

Represented countries: France (18), Great-Britain (4), the Netherlands (1)

Playing schedule: 2 days, 7 rounds (4+3) of 90 minutes

Location: The 'Salle des Associations', the home of the TNT club, is a cosy space. The number of players was limited to 40, but since there were just 6 tables, there was room enough for everyone.

Equipment: On the tables, mahjong mats were used. We know these mats, e.g. from the World Riichi Mahjong Championship; they may be a bit small, but this never was a problem since genuine Japanese sets were used. (Japanese tiles are rather small.) The mats have a nice soft surface. The scores were kept by using sticks. For the sticks, there were places in the open spaces of the border, so most of the time the in-between scores could be determined easily.

Refereeing: Kevin Chau was non-player referee.

Complaints: None.

Information / communication during the tournament:

Visible clock projected from a computer on a screen. A gong clearly informed players of the start and the end of sessions. Ranking up to date between each session thanks to the beamer.

Sessions: Excellent playing atmosphere.

Catering: In the adjacent room (sandwiches). The organizers had taken care of a simple French breakfast (coffee and brioches). There was a fine lunch, consisting of sandwiches and salads. Moreover, there was an abundance of sweets, French cheese, drinks (wine, soft drinks, etc.) TNT did a great effort to please all players!

Prizes: Presents for individual ranking (1st, 2nd and 3rd). The winner won herself a wild card for the European Riichi Championship, next year in the United Kingdom. The gifts for the top-three players were a camera, a drone (!) and a tablet.

Conclusion: It is always great to come and play in Paris or Puteaux. The French players do their utmost to give everyone a good time. Moreover, they are excellent players, which makes participating even more fun.
