

Observer report for Aachen Tournament 2017 (MERS 1)

Date: August 5th – 6th 2017

Place: Aachen, Germany

Participants: 24 players (NED 7, GER 7, FRA 4, SVK 2, GBR 2, CZE 2)

Playing schedule: 2 days, 8 rounds (5+3) of 90 minutes

Location: In the historic city center, second floor of a student community centre. One room was for playing, the second room for resting and coffee breaks.

Equipment: 5 from 6 set of mah-jong were the exactly the same. The last one had small differences.

Refereeing: Waldemar Laube was a non-playing referee.

Complaints:

- 1) There were some minor issues regarding the seating of players, some players played with other players repeatedly.
- 2) One of the tables had not the typical junk-mat and people didn't have a space on the table for riichi sticks.
- 3) One of the sets had unusual tiles. Players didn't know it at the beginning of the game (only in the first hanchan).

After complains #2 and #3, the organization team decided to change it for regular set at the second day of the tournament.

Information/communication during the tournament:

There was a visible clock on the computer. A gong clearly informed players of the start and the end of sessions. Between each session, the ranking had been updated, printed, and posted on walls.

Sessions: Ordinary FFF (Fair-play, Friendly, and Fun) is not sufficient to describe the atmosphere, I would like to emphasize the overall amenity of the venue and pleasant feelings one had at the tournament.

Catering: There were soft drinks, coffee, and tea for each coffee break, as well as snacks, biscuits, and fruits. Lunches: on Saturday a buffet, on Sunday everybody could order lunch from restaurant menu.

Prizes: Trophies for individual ranking (1st, 2nd, and 3rd).

Conclusion: Very nice tournament in Aachen. Especially the social playing before, during, and after the event itself was great!
